Donations to support the Curriculum

The Government's new donation scheme for decile 1-7 schools continues to feature in the news as eligible schools decide whether to opt into the scheme or not. As previously mentioned we are **not** able to opt into this scheme as we are a decile 9 school. Education Minister Chris Hipkins has said the government has not ruled out including high-decile schools in the scheme in future.

"Over time, our goal is to ensure that cost is not a barrier for anybody. We have to start somewhere. Decile one to seven is a reasonably significant start and then in time we'll get to look at the decile eight, nine and 10 schools again, I'm sure," he said.

"The reality, though, is that high-decile schools do find it easier to raise locally-raised funds and the numbers clearly demonstrate that."

So the Government have the assumption that all decile 8-10 schools are able to generate this extra funding from the parent community and also that parents are willing to support this.

Here is the situation we face this year. We are hopeful that parents value and are in a position to donate the funds needed to cover costs that are used to support and enhance the delivery of a broad and rich curriculum. This covers all trips (Education Outside the Classroom) and activities such as the swimming programme and the visit from the Life Education Van.

The cost of these trips and activities for all students to be involved in during the year is \$41,280. Teachers carefully plan and budget to ensure we get the best possible experience for students and they cover the breadth of the curriculum. Currently we have had funds in that cover only \$29,472 leaving a shortfall of \$11,807. This is a bigger shortfall than previous years and unless we can address this it will have an impact on our on-going ability to provide these enriching experiences for students.

How can you help:

Charlotte the Dog



Last term in Room 9 we made beeswax wraps that we could take home and reuse, instead of using single use plastic like Gladwrap or tinfoil. If they get dirty then you just wipe them down!

This is how you make beeswax wraps. You need greaseproof paper, grated beeswax, an iron, a washing line, a table or an ironing board and most importantly a piece of cotton fabric. First put your towel on the table or ironing board. Next put your greaseproof paper down (big enough to fold over your fabric). Your fabric should be cut to 25cm wide and 30 cm long. Put your fabric on one side of your paper and sprinkle beeswax all over your fabric. Then fold the other half of the greaseproof paper over your fabric. Iron on top of the paper and pull it off. Leave your fabric to dry and your done!

Look, now you've got your very own beeswax wrap and you can make as many as you want! They are much better for the environment than silly old Gladwrap or tinfoil. *By Pippa Room 9*

Cross



In-Room 17 we have been working on a RE related cross, using a paper mache and collage technique. The cross represents growth and that God is always with us.

To create the cross we used cardboard to make the cut-out. Once we had the cutout Mrs Coote taped the cardboard with masking tape so that the cross wouldn't come apart. After the tape was on we used paper towels and PVA glue to make the surface white so that the colours would look brighter. We started with the tree trunk followed by the branches and leaves. In between the branches and down the sides of the trunk we put light blue and dark blue korus. Then we started on the rays of light which represent that God is shining down on us. We used different shades of each colour to complete the design.
