# **Parent Survey Update**

Many thanks for the responses to our recent survey. The views of our school community are very useful in helping us to put our thoughts and ideas into action.

The Survey sought input into several areas. The first question was a request for ideas around establishing school wide expectations of behaviours that are aligned to our school values of joy, stewardship, faith and aroha. There were many ideas ranging from suggestions for implementing these values in our wider community to ideas specific to our school including friendship buses or benches and ways to display empathy and acceptance of others.

Our second question asked for ideas on pastoral care and reaching out to our wider community. Suggestions included making cards and praying for hospital patients, visiting retirement homes, visiting/donating to Greendoor, donating to refugee families and hospices, and river/beach clean ups. It was great to see Nikau putting their pastoral care into action recently with visits to [Riverleigh] Retirement Village, and a beach clean-up at Petone beach.

Question three asked about resources that parents have knowledge of that may help us bring the New Zealand curriculum to life within our own community. There were many useful suggestions including approaching the Hutt City Council with ideas to improve Hutt City and exploring how the Council works, visiting the District Court, forming bonds with local iwi and the Tokelauan community, visiting the Settler's Museum and Dowse, tree planting, beach clean ups, visiting Refugee centres, using libraries and their programmes and improving links with Sacred Heart.

We asked about cultural inclusiveness and whether people's experiences of our school were welcoming for their own culture. We had many positive responses as to the welcoming nature of our school and also some suggestions for how we could improve things, for example a kapa haka group, cultural clubs, more focus on Maori Language Week, having a Cultural Day. It has been great to hear about the children practising their kapa haka performance over the last weeks and we will be looking to implement some of the other suggestions over the next year.

Question five asked for thoughts on flexible learning environments such as those in rooms 13 and 14. There were a variety of responses, many reporting positive experiences for their children in rooms 13 and 14 and some expressing concern that reticent or children with learning issues may be 'lost' in these environments. We are very aware that as well as benefits there can be problems in open learning environments and we will continue to work on these issues. We appreciate that the volume in Nikau is relatively high and some children have found this difficult. In our plans for the upgrade of Nikau we have ensured that measures are in place to reduce noise, such as insulated materials and double-glazed sliding doors.

Question six asked for any further comments or ideas. Again there was a wide range of responses, many positive including praise for Book Week. Suggestions for improvements included better links with early childhood centres, more community events, a Friendship Bench, more of an arts focus, fewer emails, and ways to access what is going on during the day. We agree that community events are important - the PTA is organising a Rainbow Run in March which promises to be a wonderful community event, please come! To avoid numerous emails we have tried to make the newsletter the focal point for information such as important dates and also a resource for parents to learn about what has been happening during the school week. We are aware that parents are receiving email notifications from the parent portal as well the actual email and we are trying to resolve this. Thank you again for responding to our survey, it is always encouraging and very useful to hear the views of our community. We have taken all of the comments in your responses on board.

## - a message from Zareen

Hazardous Journey Productions Presents - Our Kids Online: The Porn Epidemic Thank you so much to everyone who attended our talk on Wednesday 27th. And a huge thank you to Kay for being so proactive in helping educate parents and protect our children online.

We have had awesome feedback © And a lot of questions!

To recap on the reason for this talk for those of you who were there, and to give some more information to those of you who could not make it, Rob and I have spent the last year researching and making a documentary 'Our Kids Online: The Porn Epidemic' about the harm being caused to children due to exposure to today's genres of free pornography online.

We started talking to leading experts and organisations focusing on this topic, as well as communities. We have been travelling within New Zealand, across the USA and are heading to Australia early next year to complete our interviewing.

A combination of the changing landscape of porn towards more violent and degrading, the availability of this type of porn on handheld devices and gaming devices and a lack of understanding and protection, has seen a massive increase in children from all walks of life being emotionally and physically harmed in life changing ways.

What we have also discovered on this journey is a massive gap between parents' knowledge about the ease and frequency with which porn is being accessed by children, the actual issues this is causing and what to do to keep them safer online. Our documentary, upcoming book, resource website and talks in schools to parents is our way of trying to close that gap, by giving all this missing information.

We are blown away by how much parents jump on board to start taking steps to keep their children safer every time we speak to them. How much hearing the information is extremely confronting and hard to hear, but how relieved they are to know it, and know what they can do. This is an issue which is becoming increasingly urgent as we have noticed such a massive change even the last few months, in terms of headlines in the news about children being harmed.

There are so many great resources out there to help parents navigate this issue. Read-a-long books to help start the conversations, online courses for parents, webinars, articles, TEDx Talks, short videos. We created our website https://www.ourkidsonline.info as a place to put a lot of the resources we have come across, as well as some of our own, for parents.





We have also been practising our striking and fielding skills by participating in a variety of drills and games. # EOTC Trips

Over the last two weeks Pohutukawa students have been busy adding to their learning about pre-Eurpoean history of Wellington and the Hutt Valley. Firstly, they all went on a trip to Wellington Museum to learn about the Maori stories of Maui, Kupe and the taniwha legend of Wellington harbour. They then boarded the boat to Matiu Somes Island to explore and learn about how it has been used and changed over time by different groups of people. Lastly, they all walked the Korokoro stream track to look at the significance it had for Te Puni and his iwi and how it has changed over time too. A big thank you to all the wonderful parent helpers who came with us to help and support the students in their learning. We couldn't have done it without you!

# St Bernard's College Science Day

**Last week** on the 12 November, Rata Area went on a trip to St Bernard's College for our annual science day. We experienced three subjects relating to science. They were Biology, Physics, and Chemistry. We learnt so much and would like to share what we did



In biology, we started out with finding out how much starch was in a doughnut. Turns out it was quite a lot! We also mixed milk with a benedict solution which turned the milk purple meaning that there was a definite sign of calcium. Then when we had finished that, our Mr Higson came around with a lamb's hearts and started handing them out to our groups. We started dissecting the heart and cutting it in half so we could experience what it felt and looked like inside, including seeing the 4 chambers. Mr Higson then started blowing through a pipe to make sheep's lungs inflate which was interesting to see but slightly gross!



In chemistry, we learned about light and electrons. Say you light a candle and the flame doesn't catch straight away; that is because the electrons have not reached your eyes yet. We learned that the flame on the candle isn't actually on the wick it is a cloud of electrons jumping to our eyes. We lit a piece of magnesium on fire that was very bright and we also got to see which chemicals changed the colour of the flame. Different chemicals caused the flame to turn pink, green, blue, pink and a really bright orange. We had a lot of fun trying to see what chemical turned the flames a certain colour.



Lastly, we went to physics. In physics, we understood what actually happens to be given an electric shock and the difference between an electric shock caused by electricity and one caused by heat. We learned that light travels faster than sound and it also travels in straight lines. If it was curved, we would be able to see around corners which is pretty interesting! We used prisms to create a rainbow with the lightbox and we created a circuit where we learnt what conductors and insulators were. Metal is a conductor and made our light bulb turn on, whereas plastic was an insulator and the light bulb didn't work when attached the piece of straw to our circuit.

Overall, we had a really awesome day at St Bernard's. We would like to thank all the teachers that taught us there and especially Brenten Higson who organised this amazing day for us. We can't wait to come back next year! By Charlotte and Eva
