Learning to Compost

The students in rooms 13 and 14 have been busy learning how to compost! Firstly, they learnt about the difference between green and brown materials and how these contribute to the process of making a compost. They then had to create a sandwich bag compost by choosing the ratio of green to brown material they wanted to use, measuring it and adding water. Over time the students will observe what happens as the different materials begin to break down.



Some students in the Pohutukawa area were also lucky to have Mr Higson, a science expert come to school and teach them about what happens in the process of composting. He shared with them about the role bacteria, air, worms, food waste, plant material all play in the process of creating compost. Using old recycled milk bottles, they made mini compost systems that are now in our school garden.



Visual Art

As part of our Te Reo Maori programme, Mrs Spink spent time exploring the story of Rangi and Papa with the students of Rooms 13 and 14. They learnt about the different gods and how they represented aspects of our natural world. The students chose one god from the story to paint with a focus on blending colours and incorporating koru patterns. They all look fabulous and are on display in Pohutukawa shared space.







Parliament - Trevor Mallard

On Tuesday the 1st of September we were very lucky in the Rata area to be visited by the parliament education team and the current 'Speaker of the House', Trevor Mallard. The team used a backdrop of the chamber of House of Representatives and arranged the seating to be just like the real thing. We had lots of interesting questions from the students for Mr Mallard. This was followed by a politician's debate which was run by the speaker himself. It was a lot of fun and so great to see the students having a go and sharing their opinions and ideas. Some of the students were lucky enough to be given specific roles within the debate. We had a prime minister, leader of the opposition and even a 'clerk of the house'. Our debate was finished with a vote by the MPs and an invitation from the speaker to visit his offices on our future trip to parliament. What a great morning!



SCIENCE - FORCES, FLIGHT & MOTION

Parachutes for eggs; easy right? Well, it's a little bit more complicated than that. The Rata area has been studying "Forces, Flight and Motion". One of their projects was to create a functioning parachute that safely carried an egg to the ground without cracking. Many pairs of students attached a padded box or cradle to absorb a bit of the shock from hitting the ground. This also kept the egg well attached to the parachute. The parachute also has to be large enough to be air-resistant. Air-resistance is the force of gravity from the egg pulling the parachute down and the air/wind pushing up.

Egg Drop Experiment

There was just one problem. Since we were dropping the eggs from the top of the playground, the bark at the bottom (meant to stop children hurting themselves, if they should fall) was too shock absorbent. Some students accidently dropped their eggs at the top, and the egg still survived. So, we compromised and moved to the intermediate deck, where there is concrete below. Since it was a shorter drop, we used a chair to expand it. Though, we did put a thin layer of newspaper underneath the balcony encase of any mess!

After that, some parachutes glided down and the egg was safe, but some were not so lucky. Approximately, 25 pairs in total cracked their eggs. This was a fun experiment for all the students to cooperate with each other and put their learning into action! Alice H-Hunt and Jane Doyle.
