### Parent helpers and proof of vaccination

Many thanks to parents who have volunteered to help with our end of term trips and activities. I appreciate this now comes with an extra effort to provide me with your proof of vaccination. A number of people have already downloaded their Vaccine Pass and used this as a useful means of providing proof of vaccination.

The need for proof of vaccination extends to the coaches and managers of school connected teams even if they are off site and after school such as touch rugby.

#### All parents and caregivers welcome on site

Vaccine passes are not needed until New Zealand moves to the COVID-19 Protection Framework. There will be certain settings where denying entry on the basis of vaccination status will be prohibited.

These settings are in regard to life-preserving services and being able to access these services (for example, public transport). The settings also include the right to access education. A vaccine pass will not be needed by any students to access learning or parents and caregivers to support their children's learning.

As currently happens, parents and caregivers will continue to be welcome to attend on site whether you are vaccinated or not. This includes activities such as dropping off, picking up or settling children at school. Such situations only involve short periods of time around other children and therefore we will not need to ask for vaccination status. Rather we will continue to give consideration to the range of health and safety mitigation that we already have in place at Alert Level 2. These have been outlined in previous correspondence but mainly include mask wearing, scanning in, social distancing from people you don't know etc

### Who else is covered by the vaccine mandate? Providers coming onsite

If we engage any provider to come onsite to provide a service and at a time where children or students are also present – then the vaccine mandate does apply. I am currently receiving confirmation emails from all our regular providers/contractors confirming their employees' vaccination status.

#### Using providers offsite

When we head off site for students to experience learning outside the classroom as we are at the moment with classes heading to the Dowse, Walter Nash, Days Bay, Surf Life Saving at Titahi Bay then the Public Health order outlines the expectations of the staff who provide the service to us. This applies to staff working or volunteering for libraries, museums, public swimming pools, school camps, movie theatres and so on.

These workers (paid or unpaid) are not covered by the vaccine mandate because they are not working 'for' a school. While we might be receiving their services when we book or use their facilities, those staff are working 'for' the local council/owner/operator.

However, as part of our COVID-19 health and safety assessments, we are checking on the vaccination status of our offsite activity providers, but we cannot require them to be vaccinated under the Vaccination Order. We have been very reassured with all their responses and their obvious concern for the safety of students whom they will be involved with.

#### **Teacher Only Day**

We hope you haven't missed the news that school will be closed next Monday 29 November for a Teacher Only Day. This will only be the fifth of the eight Teacher Only Days we are able to use over the period from June 2020 to June 2022 as COVID-19 lockdowns have impacted on previously planned ones. Just a heads up that we are planning to use one in Term One next year and two in Term Two. The dates of these will be advertised once confirmed.

#### Class Organisation for 2022

The overall classroom structure for next year will look very much like our current one. All teachers are currently involved in the placement of students into classrooms for next year as they bring knowledge of who works well together, who might benefit from being in a separate grouping etc. Much time and effort is dedicated to getting a good mix for everyone as we look for:

- A mix of students' learning abilities, behaviours and dispositions
- A good gender balance
- The age range of students
- Specific needs of students
- Friendship groupings

Occasionally parents may email me with a specific need they would like us to take into consideration when making these placements. We will always take this into account but cannot guarantee they will be reflected in the final decision as this must take into account the balance and needs of all students. For example, it is not possible to accommodate specific requests for individual teachers you or your child might like to have. We aim for a consistency of learning programmes and behaviour management across the school which provides an assurance to parents of a unified approach and quality experience for all students.

#### Reporting to Parents

As I have mentioned on and off throughout the year, we have taken a new approach with how we communicate clear, dependable information about your child/ren's progress and achievement this year. It has been continuous and timely, with key times for more formal evaluation:

Teachers have sent home a range of evidence of children's learning for you to view and discuss with them. We hope the assessment progress information included with their work has been clear and easily understood. Along with the work going home, Area Leaders have provided support for students and parents to talk to each other about learning and assessment.

Three way conferencing opportunities have been provided at the ends of Terms 1, 2 & 3 for students, parent and teachers to share and understand information and insights about children's progress and achievement with their learning, along with social and emotional development Written reports twice a year provide further summary information. As primary owners of their assessment information, students contribute valued insight to these reports. This is an important message to students - that they are involved in decisions about assessment and know where they are in their learning and what they need to do to improve. The second written report will go home with students on Friday 10 December.

Each child's parents and family are their first and most important teachers. We know and appreciate this. Our aim is for open and respectful communication between school and home so that all parents feel enabled to freely discuss your children's progress and learning with us. Progress and assessment is quite a complex business and parents are not trained teachers so we want to provide you and your children with support to talk to each other about learning and assessment. Working together we want to help you realise your aspirations for your children.

#### Plans for End-of-Year Events

As you will be aware schools have been advised by the Ministry of Education to avoid any large gatherings. Should we move to Orange on 3 December, this advice continues where large gatherings are to be limited. Also, activities such as singing and dancing are considered higher risk and should be done in well-ventilated areas or outdoors.

With these mitigations in mind and the complexities involved with everyone getting used to 'The Traffic Light System' we have made the decision that our traditional end of year celebration with its graduation and prize giving ceremonies will not go ahead in the Church with parents and families present. The same will apply for our Kowhai Carols evening.

We know this will be disappointing for many families but we hope to be able to still provide a meaningful and memorable experience for students during the school day that can be shared with families albeit in quite a different way. We have purchased a new sound system for outdoors events and are fine tuning our ability to video a quality product for you.

### LIFE EDUCATION TRUST NZ





### Rata

### **Primarily Playing with Shakespeare**

Rata area students were given the opportunity to be a part of this year's collaborative production of Julius Caesar which was held at the Pataka performance space in Porirua. After weeks of rehearsals and some very dedicated learning of lines the group headed over to Porirua for the day. The morning was filled with rehearsals and after a quick lunch break it was showtime! Students enjoyed this first taste of Shakespeare and did a fantastic job of staying in character while on stage and really connecting with the energy of the different scenes. It was fascinating to see how the different schools interpreted the script and made it their own. Here are a few photos of our theatrical superstars in action!





This term in science we have been learning about matter. Matter is everything that takes up space the three main states of Matter are Solid, Liquid and Gas. The are two extra states of matter that are Plasma and Bose-Einstein condensate also known as (BEC). On Friday we did an experiment, there were four groups, melting, solubility, acidity and acid test. For all of the tests you were given six substances which were citric acid, white flour, ground salt, baking powder, baking soda and castor sugar. The melting group was given an additional spoon, tealight candles and a box of matches. With the goal to see what substances would melt on the spoon above the candle. Which didn't really work so they got a second try with a blow torch which was a lot more successful.









The solubility group was given the same six substances and a glass jar with water. Our goal was to see what substances would dissolve in water they all dissolved but had different reactions. The acidity group had the same things as solubility except vinegar instead of water. They were trying to see what would happen to their ingredients when they add vinegar to their substances, some dissolved and some fizzed up. The acid test group had the six ingredients and pool testing strips. Their goal was to see what ones were base neutral and acid. All the tests were to do with matter and turning solids to liquid or gas.

#### Reporting

The majority of survey participants (80%) found the reporting this year informative and found that the changes have given them a good understanding of their child's learning (73%). Most parents felt that the examples of work sent home informed them of their children's learning across a arrange of curriculum areas. Parents commented positively on the learning conferences and the ability to spend time with their child and the teacher. Some parents would like more detail in the written reports and/or more pieces of work sent home during the year. Reporting to parents takes class time as students prepare for their learning conferences - most parents agreed that a balance between reporting to parents and maximising class time for learning had been achieved.

### Faith Journey

Many parents (64%) were not aware of the meetings with parents that have been hosted at the school to discuss your family's faith journey. The majority (85%) agreed with the underlying message in these meetings that family is the best place for your child to grow in faith (while being supported by their Catholic education). Parents (32.79%) were interested in attending these meetings however many felt that busy lives and time pressure meant that they would not be able to attend.

#### Restorative Justice

Half of the parents who responded were aware that the school uses a restorative justice approach to conflict resolution and half were not aware. Almost half (49%) understood what restorative justice means and how the school puts this into practice. Many parents (62%) would like more information about the restorative justice approach at our school and would be interested in attending a parent information session on restorative justice in our school. Information has been sent out in previous newsletters regarding restorative justice and the school will include this communication more regularly moving forward. The school will also look into organising an information session in the New Year.

#### Learning Support and Progress and Achievement Policies and Practices

50% of parents would be interested in attending an information session on Learning Support and 55% would be interested in attending an information session on Progress and Achievement. 58% would prefer an online event in the evening, 33% an "in person" event in the evening. Suggestions for session topics included health and wellbeing in a learning context, recognition of academic success, children's behaviour and what the school does and doesn't do to support learning difficulties. The school is looking forward to organising these information sessions in the New Year.
