Last week we enjoyed celebrating Samoan Language Week, an annual event to celebrate the culture and language of Samoa. This year's theme for Vaiaso o le Gagana Samoa was Fa'aāuāu le Folauga i le Va'a o Tautai – Continue the Voyage with Competent Wayfinders of the Ocean. A number of our Samoan students wore their traditional dress to school on Thursday to help us learn more about its significance to their culture. They also shared prayers, song and dance. We are so fortunate that our school community is such a richly ethnically diverse one.

### COVID updates

Since the beginning of the term our number of positive cases have been low (1-2 a week). However we have had a sharp rise of 10 positive cases over the weekend and an increase in children isolating as household contacts as well. Face masks continue to be the best way to suppress the spread of the virus so we appreciate your efforts to encourage your year 4+ children to wear their masks when inside the classrooms. Ensuring we have teachers in front of classrooms is proving to be a daily challenge at the moment so working together to keep things going as smoothly as possible is the best way to go.


### Pentecost Blessing

## Pentecost

This Christian holy day commemorates the coming of the Holy Spirit in the form of flames to the Apostles and other followers of Jesus Christ, as recorded in the New Testament in Acts 2:1–31.

The Holy Spirit allowed the apostles to speak in other languages, and they started preaching the word of Jesus to the Jews, who were in Jerusalem for the Feast of Pentecost. As Father Patrick pointed out, “the Feast of Pentecost invites us to recognise that Jesus’s love for us means that in sharing his Spirit he makes his home with us”



## Talofa lava!

Last Thursday we held our Nikau team hui. This hui was quite special. We had a number of performances which we all enjoyed. As last week was Samoan Language week, we had three special performances showcasing the Samoan culture.

Some students from Rata came to perform a beautiful dance, Pohutukawa students shared some language and a prayer in Samoan and finally Harleigh, Angel, Peyton and Ivory - all Nikau students - performed another Samoan dance. Our Hui also gave us an opportunity to celebrate some units of work which had come to an end.

Room 11 students used puppets to retell the Pūrakau of Ngake and Whataitai. They were very entertaining and were so much fun to watch. Room 9 students shared a dramatisation of Pentecost. Those who didn't perform helped make a stunning prop to really bring this story to life.

## Photography

For our Visual Arts focus, students in Pohutukawa have been exploring and improving their photography skills. They learnt about the rule of thirds, close ups and editing to create an image that communicated the theme of relationships. On the next page is a small selection from different classes. They look forward to sharing them with their Whānau.



The relationship in this photo is that the leaves are changing colour due to the time of season, and that means that relationships can change over time. This also shows that the dark leaves are taking over the bright, colourful, yellow leaves. The technique I used was thirds, so the picture was split because the tree is in the first two thirds of the picture. **By Francesco (right)**



This photo is showing that everything is related in some way like this girl is holding onto the wood and wood is from trees and God made trees and humans. The technique I used, was angling the camera so it was off centre. **By Kora (left)**

This photo is quite confusing but also very interesting. This is a double sided basketball hoop. In this photo I have made an upwards angle so you can see all the way through the hoop. 
# RATA
