Kia ora Parents and Caregivers,

Attendance at school

At a time when everyone is doing such an excellent job keeping sick children at home it may seem a little strange to now be focussing on attendance. But you may have read or heard of the concern being expressed across the country at the drop in regular school attendance. Regular attendance is considered to be when a student attends school 9 days in a fortnight (90% of the time). When we use this definition we have Term 1 data that tells us:

58% of students across the country were attending school regularly

44% of students across Lower Hutt were attending school regularly

73% of students at Ss Peter & Paul were attending school regularly

It was anticipated that Term 2 figures would be worse because of continuing COVID and winter illnesses.

Our school's Term 2 data confirms that, with a drop to 61.9% of students attending school regularly. The vast majority of absences were of course, due to illness.

These figures do not include students needing to self-isolate. They are considered to be present at school. On the attendance register, they are coded as 'F' meaning they are not in class but are involved in legitimate off-site learning. To ensure our data is valid and reliable could I just do a wee reminder to please provide clear information about the reason for your child's absence from school. When it is COVID related please be clear if they are isolating as a household contact or unwell with COVID. When this happens they are coded as 'M' for a medical absence.

The Government has set a goal to have 70% of students attending school regularly by 2024. Associate Education Minister, Jan Tinetti, said this recently when discussing school attendance:

"We all share responsibility and have a role to play to reverse this trend and lift attendance back up. Parents and whānau are responsible for getting their children to attend and participate, while schools and kura have to be places where students feel they are safe and belong," she said. It's an important challenge ahead for us as a country, a local community and a school to get all students who are well, at school every day. Many thanks for all your support with this.

Curriculum Donation

We know that Education Outside the Classroom, where students experience a range of trips and activities, is both enriching and engaging for them. This certainly helps keep them well connected to their learning and fully engaged in school life. This has a positive flow on effect to improved achievement levels. We are very reliant on parents' willingness and ability to pay the annual Curriculum Donation to provide this. Currently we have received approximately half of the expected donations which is very low for this time of year.

As a high decile school we are not able to access the parent donation scheme whereby the Government provides schools extra funding so they do not need to ask their parent community for donations. Currently this scheme is only open to decile 1-7 schools. It is instead expected that schools like ours (decile 8-10) are able to rely on parent donations to provide a range of extra opportunities for students.

Area Leaders set their trips and activities budget by multiplying the number of students in their Area by their Area curriculum donation. No student would ever be denied the opportunity to take part in a trip or activity but it is not financially viable for the school to continue to fund the shortfall from what we anticipate will come in and what actually does. We would have to instead reduce the donation and corresponding range of trips and activities to the level that parents were able and willing to pay.

For those families who are yet to pay their curriculum donation, you will shortly receive a reminder about this from Teresa, our Accounts Officer. As long as it does not pose a financial hardship for you, I do encourage you to consider payment so we can maintain the level of opportunities for your children. Many thanks.



Maths

At the end of last term in maths we learnt about translation, symmetry, reflection and rotation of plane shapes. We also learnt about Kowhaiwhai patterns and used our new knowledge to help create our own Kowhaiwhai patterns for printmaking. We loved the process of using the ink paints to create our prints and were really happy with the results.

We indented our pattern onto a piece of foam rubber with our pencil. Then we rolled the ink onto the rubber, flipped it onto the paper and pressed down hard. I repeated the process a couple of times and when I did I flipped, rotated and made a line of symmetry on my paper. We let our prints dry for a day and then they were finished! I felt very proud and happy with my Kowhaiwhai patterns because I knew I had tried my best and this was a new thing I had learnt.
