## Reading for pleasure - a door to success

We have just finished a most successful Safari Book Week which you will see more of throughout the newsletter. Many thanks to Anna Gerritsen, our school librarian and Victoria McHalick, our teacher with library responsibility, for their leadership and commitment to our school library. Thanks also to the number of students who gave of their time and talent leading up to and during the week. The library looked amazing! Our library is a highly valued part of our school and it's well stocked with books that our students want to read because libraries are important and reading for pleasure is one of the most important things we can encourage in our children.

A growing body of research shows that reading engagement is a key element in a student's success. When children are engaged in their reading they experience both the joy and magic that comes from reading for pleasure and the long term learning and life benefits this can bring. Easy access to books and high-interest reading material is important. Children with books of their own read more, and more frequently. Students who are members of a library are twice as likely to read at home. Research has repeatedly shown that when parents are involved in supporting and encouraging their children's engagement in reading, this is a more powerful force for educational success than family background or social circumstances.

The benefits of reading for pleasure extend beyond increased educational outcomes to improved wellbeing, health, and connections with others. Working together across our school and community, we can reap the benefits that reading for pleasure can bring.

# Attendance and Engagement Strategy - Every Day Matters

The Government has developed a strategy for tackling the decade-long decline in regular attendance and engagement in schools. The strategy has three key parts: clear expectations for everyone involved, ambitious targets for attendance levels, and bold actions.

At our recent Board meeting I shared a recent report of our Term 1 data which compared our school's attendance to schools of similar decile and within the Wellington region. We compared favourably with all year levels. The percentage of Year 4 students (our highest attending group) attending regularly was greater in our school than in all comparison groups. This group was sitting on 80% of students attending regularly. Regular attendance is considered to be when a student attends school 9 days in a fortnight (90% of the time).

As we get through these winter ills we hope to see our attendance rates climb even higher and across all year groups. You can monitor your children's attendance through the Parent Portal. Any problems with this, please contact our helpful office team who will sort this out for you very quickly.

You can <u>click here</u> to read the Ministry of Education's guidelines to schools on the use of school attendance codes. It would be very helpful if you could familiarise yourself with these especially if you notice any unjustified absences on your child's attendance record. Parents can sometimes be surprised that their explanation of an absence does not automatically make it a justified one. These surprises occur mostly with the E and M codes.

Please help our office team by ensuring you give a clear reason for any absence from school as this saves them time having to make follow up phone calls.

# BOOK CHARACTER WEEK







Book Safari was an opportunity for our students to engage with books about curious creatures, new places and cultures, but also to go on a safari of the mind into new areas of interest and discovery. "My favourite part was gagaball, you hit the ball with your hands and try to not get hit" - *Jirah* 

















# Kowhai's Book Week

Senior Disco, 7.30pm to 8.30pm - Year 4 to Year 8


