As your board, we are excited to get back to a regular series of newsletter updates after each board meeting.


In our recent meeting our wonderful principal, Kay Tester, provided us with an overview of achievements towards our strategic goals. Of particular highlight for me, was hearing that our very own Dr Ivy Abella was presenting "The Kura Ahurea Experience; Developing a Whole School Approach to Te Reo Maori Teaching and Learning" at the Action Research, Action Learning International Congress. in confirming our approach.



NZTA/Waka Kotahi Visit

Meredith, Levi, Julie and Joel from NZTA/Waka Kotahi came to tell us about the new cycleway they are building between Lower Hutt and Wellington City.

This route is known as Te Ara Tupua. Tupua means 'spiritual' and ara means 'path'. This project was first debated at Parliament in 1918, over a century ago!

It was first estimated to cost \$30m, but now it is likely to be \$300m. It has taken 10 years to plan and the construction of the cycleway is estimated to be finished in 2026. When it's completed, around 2,500 people are expected to use it each day by 2030.

Engineers are trying to make it stable enough to survive a natural disaster, such as an earthquake or tsunami. To do this they travelled overseas to investigate how the seawall and seablocks are constructed.

Birds, marine life (in particular sea slugs) and the ecology have been protected; their habitats have been protected and maintained.

This project involves lots of different groups who came together, environmental organisations, marine biologists, NZ Government, local iwi, Kiwirail, engineers, geologists, NZTA, design and construction companies.




Debating

Are you and your whanau protected from Measles?

With people travelling overseas again, there's a risk that someone with measles could unknowingly bring the disease back to Aotearoa.

Measles spreads easily and quickly, usually between people who are unimmunised or only partially immunised. It can be serious and life threatening. In the 2019 measles outbreak in Aotearoa more than 30% of the people infected had to be admitted to hospital.

The best protection against measles is the free MMR vaccine. It will protect you and your whānau, and prevent the virus from spreading. You will be protected against measles if you:

had 2 doses of the MMR vaccine
had measles before
were born before 1 Jan 1969.

If you're unsure if you or your tamariki have had any or both doses of the MMR vaccine, check by calling your GP or hauora provider. Alternatively, check your Plunket Well Child Tamariki Ora book. If you're still not sure, be safe and get immunised – there are no safety concerns with having an extra dose. MMR vaccines are free at your local health provider and many pharmacies.

As measles still occurs in many countries, if you're travelling overseas these holidays it's especially important to be immunised to prevent the risk of being unknowingly infected and causing an outbreak in Aotearoa on your return.
