




Kowhai Love Reading!

reading such as; before or after school or a bedtime story can help foster a love of reading, so thank you so much everyone!



"I love reading because it helps me learn and make sentences. My favourite story is Dad Snores and I love reading it with Dad." **Brooke**














"I love reading because it gives me knowledge. I am getting smarter and I can read the tricky words. My favourite story is The BFG by Roald Dahl." **Zayla**

Statistical Literacy

For the last few weeks in maths, we have been learning about statistical literacy. This means being able to understand data, graphs and statistics. We have been learning to read and prepare dot plots, pictographs and bar graphs. They can be used in many different ways. One of the most important parts that you need to look for in dot plots and pictographs is the key so you can correctly figure out the value of the data plotted.

Sentence Writing

In Pohutukawa this term we have been learning how to add more detail to make our writing interesting by writing compound and complex sentences.

A simple sentence is just one idea, for example "The dog is hungry". A compound sentence is when two ideas are connected to make one sentence using words like "and", "but" or "for". An example of a compound sentence is: "The cinema was sold out, so we had to watch a movie on TV". A sentence that has at least one independent clause and at least one dependent clause is a complex sentence, for example: "Even though it was about to rain, I wanted to go for a walk".

We have been practising writing like a scientist and using these types of sentences in a piece of writing we are working on about potential and kinetic energy as we learn about the power of forces. By Lincoln and Kaleb

In our writing time we have been learning to create mood and show, not tell our audience what is happening in our short stories. In this sample of my writing I tried to create an excited and positive mood as the setting is a birthday party. I have learnt that working hard on the editing process is where I can really give my writing more impact. **Annabelle**

"Look Mum, we're almost there!" The girl was craning her neck to catch a glimpse of the blue cottage hidden behind shady trees.

"Oh do sit down."

But no matter how hard she tried her mothers harsh voice couldn't dampen her spirits. They pulled up to a wonky porch that overlooked the Cornish sea, the hazy morning light shone down on the rippling water. The car door flew open and out scrambled the girl, running towards the front door.

"Grandpa!"

It's really important to know that your first draft is often very far from your final version. Editing is key when trying to show your reader a scene and make them feel engaged in your story. I learnt that sometimes less is more and that you really have to try and match the language to the story and not over do it. A simple message is sometimes more powerful than a dramatic or theatrical one. I am really happy with my end result. **Renny**
