We strive for a consistent school-wide approach to help our students manage their behaviour and

their relationships with one another. This approach supports students to develop social and conflict resolution skills. It aims to help them repair relationships and build well-being: increasing their empathy and ability to solve social problems that arise both inside and outside the classroom. Our school values have formed the basis for

identifying behaviours, attitudes and dispositions that will support both student learning and social and emotional development. We have a poster that features prominently in every classroom and teachers work with their classes to unpack what these would look like in the classroom and playground. We now have images of these on our school website and in the glass display area in the main entrance walkway. When a conflict situation arises teachers use the structure of a restorative conversation with the

students involved. The essence of a restorative

conversation involves four big questions which a teacher will lead students through: • Tell the story (What happened?)

• Explore the harm (Who has been affected and how?) • Repair the harm (What do we need to do to put things right?)

• Move forward (How can we make sure this

doesn't happen again?)


Our beautiful sunflowers are coming to the end of their flowering season. We aim to hang them up to dry so we can harvest the seeds for next summer. A great way for the children to see how


his knowledge of his iwi's history and what life was like before the arrival of European settlers.
